

SPEF Receives Outstanding Program Award from Oklahoma Foundation of Excellence

On May 10, 2025, SPEF was recognized as one of three public school foundations in the state for having an OUTSTANDING PROGRAM by the Oklahoma Foundation of Excellence. This award represents what can be accomplished when educators place students first and the foundation comes alongside to turn their passion and vision into reality. The PreK Play-Based Learning initiative was a collaboration between SPS and SPEF and made possible by The Simmons First Foundation, with additional funding for play-based endeavors from The Wondertorium. A \$1,000 donation accompanied the award. SPEF Trustees voted to apply those funds to the new Kindergarten Play-Based venture launching this year (read more below).

Adopt-An-Author Visits Are a Hit After Five-Year Pause

After many years without a visiting author (the last Adopt-An-Author visit was in February 2020, right before COVID shutdowns), SPEF was proud to be a part of welcoming authors for both elementary and secondary sites. In November 2024, Adam Rex, author/illustrator of over 40 books, (including a 2025 Sequoyah Children's Book Finalist, Gumluck the Wizard) visited all six elementary sites to talk about the creative process that goes into completing a book.

In March 2025, Dante Madema visited SJHS and SHS. She brought a binder of 98 rejection letters from when she was querying for an agent. She talked with the kids about persevering through that, and how it only takes one yes. If it is a lifelong dream, you have to keep trying and believing in yourself!

Simmons First Foundation Makes Kindergarten Play-Based Learning Program Possible

Thanks to the incredible success of the PreK Play-Based Learning initiative that launched in 2023, SPEF is thrilled to partner with Simmons First Foundation once again to bring the same kind of programming to Kindergarten classrooms across the district. Thanks to the Simmons First Foundation's grant of \$23,000, SPEF matched their funding to provide SPS with play-based resources that align with Kindergarten curriculum. These materials engage children through imaginative play while simultaneously providing avenues for educators to teach math, literacy, problem-solving, and social-emotional skills.
